

What to Bring to the Testing Session

- \$15 is the current test fee. We prefer the exact amount in cash or a check made out to: ARRL-VEC
- A government photo ID (driver's license or state ID card preferred).
- Your Social Security Number or FCC Federal Registration Number. We are required to submit either your Social Security Number (SSN) or your FCC Federal Registration Number (FRN) with your application. If you are upgrading, your FRN is on your current Amateur Radio license.
- A pen (black ink) and pencil (we can loan you either or both)
- If you already have an Amateur Radio license: The original (*and one copy*) of any current (*unexpired*) <u>amateur radio operator license</u> issued to you.
- If you've already passed a test: The original (**and one copy**) of any document that you will use to prove you've already passed a test element. These documents may include:
 - An unexpired Certificate of Successful Completion of Exam (**CSCE**) indicating the credit(s) earned indicating the credit(s) earned.
 - Original and copy of a pre-March 21, 1987 Technician license (this provides credit for the Element 3 [General] exam) - you must be currently licensed to get this credit.
- Expired License? Original and copy of your expired Amateur Radio License you must take and pass element 2 to re-instate your license.

New General Question Pool to Take Effect July 1

On **July 1, 2015** a new Element 3 General class question pool will take effect for examinations. VECs and VEs will have new test designs available for use at exam sessions effective that date.


The newly revised pool released in December 2014 (updated February 11, 2015) by the Question Pool Committee (QPC) of the National Conference of Volunteer Examiner Coordinators (NCVEC) must be in use starting July 1st. There is one graphic required for this pool and 462 questions in this pool, up slightly from 456 in the previous pool. Questions G1E10 and G5B08 have been formally withdrawn from use and should not appear on exams. To view the new General class pool, visit the NCVEC web site at http://ncvec.org/page.php?id=364.

The question pools review is part of a regular process and each question pool is reviewed and updated on a four year rotation. The Extra pool is scheduled for an update in 2016. No question pools are scheduled to be updated or released in 2017. Everyone remembers the poster captioned "**I want you!**" with Uncle Sam pointing his finger directly at the viewer. It was a classic and very compelling recruitment poster for the military services.

Well, to paraphrase the poster, "We Need You!" That's right, your local amateur radio emergency and public service teams need your membership and participation.

On behalf of the Portage County EMA's Communications Unit/RACES team let me tell you that I don't think that you can find a better opportunity to become a valued volunteer for your community. While the Comms Unit can always operate under RACES rules if circumstances require, its strength is in its ability to perform a wide variety of tasks which can also include the use of both public safety and amateur radio equipment.

The Comms Unit staffs the county's Mobile Command Post when it is deployed and CU team members have the opportunity to work and interact with other county teams such as the Dive Team, Urban Search and Rescue, and



HAZMAT, plus all of the police and fire departments. A number of the CU members have also become members of the county's Incident Management Assistance Team.

The Comms Unit conducts biweekly training nets, meets monthly for regular training, and holds quarterly drills. The training can be an excellent way of expanding and developing your practical and technical skills as an amateur radio communications volunteer. The Amateur Radio Emergency Service[®] (ARES[®]) of Portage County can also benefit from your active involvement as an ARES[®] member. It conducts its own biweekly training nets and also conducts Skywarn nets during severe weather events.

PCARS and the DX Engineering Catalog Cover


The new Spring/Summer 2015 edition of the DX Engineering catalog is out.




Charlie the Tuner's HF High-Lites

FCC Eliminates Amateur Radio Vanity Call Sign Regulatory Fee

The FCC is eliminating the regulatory fee to apply for an Amateur Radio vanity call sign. The change will not go into effect, however, until required congressional notice has been given. This will take at least 90 days. As the Commission explained in a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking, Report and Order, and Order (MD Docket 14-92 [<u>http://transition.fcc.gov/Daily_Releases/Daily_Business/2015/db0521/FCC-15-59A1.pdf</u>]and others), released May 21, it's a matter of simple economics.

"The Commission spends more resources on processing the regulatory fees and issuing refunds than the amount of the regulatory fee payment," the FCC said. "As our costs now exceed the regulatory fee, we are eliminating this regulatory fee category." The current vanity call sign regulatory fee is \$21.40, the highest in several years. The FCC reported there were 11,500 "payment units" in FY 2014 and estimated that it would collect nearly \$246,100.



In its 2014 Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM) regarding the assessment and collection of regulatory fees for FY 2014, the FCC had sought comment on eliminating several smaller regulatory fee categories, such as those for vanity call signs and GMRS. It concluded in the subsequent Report and Order (R&O) last summer, however, that it did not have "adequate support to determine whether the cost of recovery and burden on small entities outweighed the collected revenue or whether eliminating the fee would adversely affect the licensing process."

The FCC said it has since had an opportunity to obtain and analyze support concerning the collection of the regulatory fees for Amateur Vanity and GMRS, which the FCC said comprise, on average, more than 20,000 licenses that are newly obtained or renewed, every 10 and 5 years, respectively.

"The Commission often receives multiple applications for the same vanity call sign, but only one applicant can be issued that call sign," the FCC explained. "In such cases, the Commission issues refunds for all the remaining applicants. In addition to staff and computer time to process payments and issue refunds, there is an additional expense to issue checks for the applicants who cannot be refunded electronically."

The Commission said that after it provides the required congressional notification, Amateur Radio vanity program applicants "will no longer be financially burdened with such payments, and the Commission will no longer incur these administrative costs that exceed the fee payments. The revenue that the Commission would otherwise collect from these regulatory fee categories will be proportionally assessed on other wireless fee categories."

The FCC said it would not issue refunds to licensees who paid the regulatory fee prior to its official elimination.



May 31, 1985 Tornado Outbreak: 30th Anniversary

On the evening of May 31st, 1985, a devastating and deadly tornado outbreak struck the Northeastern United States and Canada. 43 tornadoes and numerous damaging thunderstorms tore across Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, and Ontario. This event was the deadliest tornado outbreak of the 1980's; killing 89 people in




total, injuring more than 1,000 others, and racking up more than \$600 million in property damage. In fact, since May 31, 1985, only two tornado days have been deadlier in the entire United States.

The storms were the result of high levels of atmospheric instability present in an environment favorable for tornadic thunderstorms, triggered by the passage of a strong late-spring cold front. Quoting the original survey report produced by NOAA in 1985, "perhaps the lesson to be learned from the 1985 outbreak is that under the proper atmospheric conditions, major tornadoes can occur irrespective of the location or terrain".





We had a fantastic turnout for our Field Day meeting on the 26th of May. Nineteen members showed up and we covered a number of topics and addressed a few problem areas. Maybe "problem" is not the correct word. Let's say areas of concern.

It has been decided that we will be using the club's Yaesu FT 1000 for the rig at the 20m station this year. We know it has a very good receiver front



end and all the filters are loaded. The DSP works very well in this rig and it should help us with the interference issues we have been having in the past. Jack, N8BI, has graciously donated 75 ft of coax so that we can have a dedicated feed line for the tower we will be using from now on for the 20m station. He will also be allowing use of some filters to further help with the interference issue.

We will be using my Kenwood TS-570s for the Flex station this year since Rick, K8CAV is very familiar with a 570, having owned one himself. We had a generous offer from Jim - KC8PD - of his IC 706, but being a menu driven radio, it was decided that it would be better to have a rig with more knobs and buttons to push and or turn than to try and remember in what menu you might find something you want to change. Jim's offer was very appreciated.

We have arranged to have a member of the Power Team to establish "squatters rights" at the smaller pavilion this year since that will be where the CW station will set up. We wanted to make sure that we would not be ousted from there by someone having a picnic or other celebration that would cause us to scramble the morning of Field Day trying to find another spot of the CW guys.

Parky volunteered to have a brief educational presentation on what is needed to attend a VE session and take an Amateur License exam.

Two areas still need volunteer help. These are the Power Team and Food Service. Both are vital to our operation. James and his crew need people to help with pulling cables and getting set up and I am very sure that they will also need people to help tear down. Please let James KD8VT know if you can be of any assistance.

Mike, KD8FLZ, really needs people to step up and offer their assistance in food preparation and cooking. This is very important because if we do not have the help, we will not eat!! And don't think that this is an idle threat. Food Service is extremely important and has been a big part of our FD event. So please, contact Mike and volunteer.

A funny thing happened on the way to the Flex station operator and logger roster – it doesn't exist! And it doesn't exist because – no one's volunteered yet. OK I need to take a big part of the hit on that one because we had to make a few last minute changes at the station captain position and word hadn't gotten out. But all that's changed so here's your chance to let me know that you're all in for Flex!

The Flex station is both frequency and mode agile meaning that we can operate on a number of different bands with phone, CW, and digital, as long as we stay within the Field Day rules which basically say you can't have more than one station any given band/mode combination at the same time. That eliminates 20 and 40 phone during the entire Field Day period, and also eliminates CW on the same band and at the same the CW station is operating on, but that still leaves a lot of radio real estate to use.

The Flex station will be equipped with a Kenwood TS-570 radio, external antenna tuner, Buckmaster OCF dipole, and laptop computer/sound card interface. The only thing you need to bring is your key or paddle with cord and jack for CW ops. The connection for a straight key is a ¹/₄" phone jack with ground attached to sleeve and hot attached to tip and for a paddle, ground attached to sleeve, dash attached to ring, and dot attached to tip.

So come on out and enjoy some flexible fun! (sounds like a painful mat game eh?) Send me an e-mail at <u>k8cav@portcars.org</u> and let me know when you'd like to operate or log, and a preferred mode. See you at Field Day!

Four Days In May

Every year, for the past 20 years, the QRP Amateur Radio Club International has held its convention, Four Days In May (FDIM) in conjunction with the Dayton Hamvention. While the Hamvention runs Friday - Saturday - Sunday, FDIM starts with an all day educational program on Thursday. Currently held at the Holiday Inn in Fairborn, OH (just outside of Dayton), this year's seminar was attended by 324, and the QRP Banquet was host to 252. There were attendees from all over North America, Europe, Asia, Kent and Parkman.



The Conference began at 8:50 AM on Thursday morning, the presenter being EricSchwartz – W6HHQ – from Elecraft. Eric talked about the new and improved K3s, as well as the KX3. It was an interesting and technical description of all the new features. I learned a lot about their product line.

Next up was Jay Slough – K4ZLE – with a dissertation on transmission lines, SWR, Smith Charts and antenna matching. The goal is to radiate as much of your output power as possible as RF, not heat.



Rev. George Dobbs – G3RJV – was one of the founders of FDIM, and this was his 17th year in attendance, which was also proclaimed as the last year that he would be able to participate. (By the way, George was also presented with the 2015 Hamvention award for Technical Excellence) George's presentations are always a mixture of history, philosophy, personal experience and technical illustrations. He took us through a lot of his personal history with FDIM and the people who have always been at the forefront of the QRP niche of Ham Radio.

Following was Dr. Paul Darlington – M0XPD - with a presentation on the bandwidth of radio signals, and its significance to designing simple, but effective radio receivers. Personally, I was all set up for my afternoon nap, HOWEVER, this presentation was to me one of the high-lites of the day! Some hard to visualize concepts were presented in a way that made them both understandable and very entertaining. Mr. Darlington has accepted an invitation to speak at the May 2016 PCARS meeting, and if we can get all the details worked out around next years FDIM I'm sure it will be a fun and interesting meeting for all!



Mike Bryce – WB8VGE – gave anyone interested in home brewing projects enough information to end up with professionally made circuit boards that are reasonably priced and laid out by computer. Through the presentation, he went through all the processes that anyone who has been in the hobby as a builder for 20 years or more remembered and had struggled with. The final solution is companies that offer software to design the boards and then will make the boards for you so you end up with professional looking projects.

Finally, Glen Popiel – KW5GP – gave a presentation on the Arduino chip. He started with some Arduino basics and then moved on to practical applications in ham radio. Through the presentation he explained what was available, where to obtain it and how to make it work. On application was taking a rockmite transceiver kit and adding a DDS VFO to it. He went on to give many more examples of useful projects for Hams based on the Arduino.



After all of that, Thursday night was Vendor night and the ballroom of the Holiday Inn was turned into a miniature hamfest with special deals for the QRP group. Friday, after a full day at Hamvention, the hotel ballroom was set up for "home brew" night, where anyone who wanted to brought along their home brew gear and everyone in attendance voted for the best projects. They were awarded prizes at the QRP Banquet.

The banquet was what you would expect from the venue, probably not the fanciest but certainly enjoyable. Other than recognition of many hams for their accomplishments in the QRP community, there were a lot of door prizes given away. As expected, a ham sitting next to me (too bad for Chuck it was the guy on the other side) won one of the grand prizes, a Begali key.

Through the years I've attended many FDIM programs. It may be low power, but it's always a group of high class, friendly people. Anyone can toss a ton of money into a bunch of high power equipment, press the mic button and say "Breaker, Breaker". Sure, everyone will hear them. But, when you want to enjoy the challenge, and learn the skills, make and understand your own equipment and do things they say can't be done, then maybe QRP is the thrill you're looking for!


Dale's Tales for June 2015


From the Great Lakes ARRL Vice Director

House Bill 1301: Current FCC Regulations allow homeowners in deed-restricted residences to install TV receive only (TVRO) antennas. This includes both dish antennas and conventional over the air antennas. "*Amateur Radio Parity Act*" HB 1301 was introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives to direct the FCC to allow Radio Amateurs to have "parity" with the current TVRO antenna regulations and install reasonable ham radio antennas. At the recent ARRL EXPO at the Dayton Hamvention[®], we were successful in preparing more than 800 signed letters from Radio Amateurs covering over 100 Congressional Districts. These will now be hand delivered to their Congressmen. The ARRL Web Page <u>http://www.arrl.org/hr-1301</u> contains the complete text of the bill.




