



Club of the year: The Portage County Amateur Radio Service



The Portage County Amateur Radio Service (PCARS) was established in November of 2005. It is an ARRL Affiliated Club and an ARRL Special Service Club.

PCARS has an average of 43 hours of club activities per month including special interest groups, license training, contests run from our club site, and club social events. Our members cover a wide range of interests that allow us to support public safety organizations, student outreach programs and activities focused on growing our hobby. We love to share our experiences and have a requirement that our events be filled with a lot of fun. Members have joined PCARS because of all the activities and fun we have.

We have created our own contests and events including our annual Freeze Your Acorns Off in February and Ohio State Parks on the Air that was used as a model for the ARRL's[™] NPOTA contest. We have also donated time and money to our community including over \$6,000 in 2017.

We have several "Build Days" each year where we have projects covering home built transceivers, antennas, and digital equipment to allow members to inexpensively grow into new areas of the hobby. Each month we have at least one GOTA (Get On the Air) day where members and non-members can use club site equipment to learn about HF and new modes of operation. It is all about building our hobby, helping our community, building our skills and most of all having fun.

Friday was a good day at the fest, and then we went to the DX banquet that evening. First off, you can't go



Xenia Enjoys a Second, More Successful Year Playing Host to ''Dayton''

From the ARRL

Hamvention[®] 2018 returned to the Greene County Fairgrounds and Expo Center in Xenia, Ohio, for a second year, earning high marks for attendance, the debut of many new Amateur Radio transceivers, and tasty food.

"Other than the rain showersFriday and Saturday, the event seemed to go very smoothly," said QST Editor Steve Ford, WB8IMY, who has been on hand for many past Hamventions. "Many attendees, great food, and a spacious layout that made it easy to get around. It is a much better venue than Hara," he added. Others who commented on the Hamvention Facebook page agreed, although some complained that the flea market area was too small, still muddy, and not as well attended as in past years, when the flea market was Dayton Hamvention. Many credited the Dayton Amateur Radio Association (DARA) for putting on a great show while still addressing needed improvements.

Ford said the rain, which included a Saturday thundershower, did not deter the crowds, although indoor exhibit areas were packed at times, reminiscent of the steamy traffic jams of the past at Hara Arena during wet weather.

ARRL EXPO, the focus of ARRL's Hamvention presence, saw considerable traffic, and visitors kept those tending the ARRL Store quite busy. Ford said attendees seemed to appreciate the ARRL Stage, where talks on various topics were presented throughout the show. ARRL Marketing Manager Bob Inderbitzen, NQ1R, said the ARRL team included nearly 100 people -- from Field Organization

volunteers, Section Managers, Officers, Directors, Vice Directors, partners, served agency representatives, ARRL staff, and members who helped out.

Ford postulated that Hamvention 2018 may have witnessed a record number of new Amateur Radio

products. New transceivers included Icom's IC-7610, Kenwood's TS-890S, Yaesu's FTDX-101D, and FlexRadio's FLEX-6400M and FLEX-6600M. CommRadio introduced its CTX-10, a compact SDR-based QRP transceiver. Other new products ranged from CW keys, to digital mode interfaces, to audio processors and amplifiers. The August issue of QST will provide a roundup.

Showers persisted into Saturday. "Hamvention's attempts to mitigate last year's mud issues in the flea market area seemed to help, although the relentless rain proved to be a challenge," Ford observed. "As a result, the indoor exhibits appeared to receive the lion's share of the traffic."

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Perhaps as a result of the wet weather, Hamvention forums proved popular. For example, a nearly standing-room-only crowd to the RTTY Contesting forum heard ARRL Southwestern Division Vice Director Ned Stearns, AA7A, discuss FT8 as a possible replacement for RTTY in contest applications. Stearns has been involved in proving out FT8 DXpedition Mode. The ARRL membership forum also drew a substantial crowd. After comments by President Rick Roderick, K5UR, Great Lakes Division Director Dale Williams, WA8EFK, addressed potential changes to the Amateur Radio Emergency Service[®] (ARES) program.

At Hamvention, ARRL Section Managers Oscar Resto, KP4RF (right) and Fred Kleber, K9VV, accepted the 2017 ARRL International Humanitarian Award on behalf of the radio amateurs of Puerto Rico and the US Virgin Islands.

The skies cleared on Sunday, and bargain hunters flocked to the Fairgrounds. A number of exhibitors commented that it was the largest Hamvention Sunday attendance they'd seen in a long time.



Young attendees seemed to be in greater evidence this year, including teams of students interested in combining Amateur Radio with robotics. For example, the First Roboticscompetition teams were on hand to demonstrate their creations.

The Yasme Foundation-sponsored "Ham Radio 2.0 -- Innovation and Discovery" area was a big hit, Yasme Foundation President Ward Silver, NOAX, said. "Subjects ranged from high-bandwidth satellite designs to Summits on the Air (SOTA), HamSCI's 2017 Solar Eclipse QSO Party (SEQP) research, and QSLs." Silver said the goal was to help diverse groups meet and interact. Researcher Nathaniel Frissell, W2NAF, who staffed the HamSCI booth, reported "a tremendous response."

Florian Zwingl, OE3FTA, of Austria, and Koos Fick, ZR6KF, of South Africa represented the IARU Region 1 group Youngsters on the Air (YOTA), promoting YOTA in IARU Region 2 (the Americas). The YOTA "Summer Camp" will be held in August in South Africa -- when it's winter in the Southern Hemisphere.

"The weather notwithstanding, the mood was clearly upbeat. The open layout of the Xenia Fairgrounds drew compliments as attendees found it much easier to navigate than Hara Arena," Ford said. "The Dayton

Amateur Radio Association also received kudos for their smooth management of the event. The food vendors drew rave reviews with delights ranging from standard carnival fare to ethnic cuisine."



- \$15 is the current test fee. We prefer the exact amount in cash or a check made out to: ARRL-VEC
- A government photo ID (driver's license or state ID card preferred).
- Your Social Security Number or FCC Federal Registration Number. We are required to submit either your Social Security Number (SSN) or your FCC Federal Registration Number (FRN) with your application. If you are upgrading, your FRN is on your current Amateur Radio license.
- A pen (black ink) and pencil (we can loan you either or both)
- If you already have an Amateur Radio license: One <u>copy</u> of any current (*unexpired*) <u>amateur radio operator license</u> issued to you.
- If you've already passed a test: The original (**and one copy**) of any document that you will use to prove you've already passed a test element. These documents may include:
 - An unexpired Certificate of Successful Completion of Exam (**CSCE**) indicating the credit(s) earned indicating the credit(s) earned.
 - Original and copy of a pre-March 21, 1987 Technician license (this provides credit for the Element 3 [General] exam) you must be currently licensed to get this credit.



Expired License? Original and copy of your expired Amateur Radio License - you must take and pass Element number 2 to re-instate your license.

June 30 is the **LAST DAY** of the 2014 Technician Class License Question Pool and resulting exams...as a NEW Question Pool and resulting exams take effect on July 1. I know there's always a listing in The RADIOGRAM about VE Testing (including a session at Field Day on June 23), but those who may not realize, or have forgotten about the Question Pool change, will be in for a rude

awakening at exam sessions after July 1, if they studied the 2014 Technician Class Question Pool!!

While there isn't much change in the current Technician Class Question Pool, and the new one, what change there is could mean the difference between passing and failing the exam!! Basically, it's no fun after one spends all that time studying, and then spending the test fee, to find out they flunked the exam, because they studied the wrong material!! That has happened more than once at sessions that I've been a part of in central Arkansas.

As a side note, the General Class Question Pool is being revised, and will likely be released either in December, 2018, or more likely January, 2019 -- and after any needed corrections, it will become effective on July 1, 2019.

Conversely, the Amateur Extra Class Question Pool will get revised in 2019, and be released either in December, 2019, or January, 2020 -- taking effect on July 1, 2020.

Then, the pool revisions "take a break" in 2021...and the whole cycle starts again in 2022.

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Ten Fun Things to do on HF from a City Lot

When I was first licensed (1980), I was living with my folks on the north side of Alliance. We had a small lot, so a tower and humongous antenna was not in the cards. I found ways to get on the air on a budget. The first station was a Drake 2NT (CW Only) transmitter and Drake (2C/2CO) receiver. The antenna was an end-fed long wire.

Obviously, I was not the strongest signal on the band. But, I managed to get on the air and have fun. I've moved a few times since then, but always landed on a small city lot. My current QTH is the largest I've had, at 125' x 125'.

The following list details just some of the things that I've had fun with over the years. You'll notice that DXing isn't on the list. The DX bug never bit me. I've worked DX, but never got overly excited about it.

So, here are some ideas. I'm not going into a great amount of detail on these, but you see something that interests you, use our friend, Google for more information.

1. Get your WAS - This is Worked All States, and was a fun one for me. LOTW makes this one even easier. The quest for the Triple Play Award is also fun. The Triple Play, in case you are wondering, involves achieving WAS on each of three modes (Phone,

CW, and Digital).

- 2. WAC WAC stands for Worked All Continents.
- 3. Chase Counties There are over 3000 counties in the US. County Hunting can be an ongoing quest, or a lifelong passion.
- 4. QSO Parties These contests tend to be a lot less formal than some of the larger contests. Also, operating a QSO Party is a great way to increase your state, and county numbers.
- 5. Paper Chasing On any given weekend, you can find lots of Special Event stations on the air. Most offer a commemorative QSL, or certificate for a SASE, or a couple green stamps. Some offer a certificate you can download. Check out W8KNO's "Paper Chase" column in most issues of the Radiogram for more about Paper (Awards) Chasing.
- 6. Collect QSL Cards Not as many ops send paper cards today, but many still do. There's still a thrill whenever a new card arrives in the mailbox.
- 7. WAS & Awards nets Whether you are into awards, or Worked All States, or collecting QSL cards, you should check out some of the Worked all States & awards nets. The 3905 Century club is the one that I'm most familiar with. There is also YL-ISSB, and OMISS.
- 8. Traffic Handling This is a fun and needed skill that Hams should at least familiarize themselves with.













- 9. Learn CW This is not only a fun part of the hobby, but at one time is was a required language in order to get your license. At this part of the solar cycle, CW is sometimes the mode of choice to work that new one; especially is your station is less than optimum.
- Learn Digital Modes Getting on digital modes has never been easier. There are lots of modes, too (RTTY, PSK, JT65, FT8, etc.). All you need is a computer and an interface. Many of the digital modes will decode signals that would be difficult to copy on phone.

And there's more ways to have fun with Ham Radio from a city lot. I've only scratched the surface month. Sometime this summer, I'll be doing a story about the Parks On The Air & WWFF programs, and why they are similar. Watch for that in an upcoming issue of the Radiogram.





Becoming a Ham in Other Parts of the World

requirements in different countries and found some of them very interesting. This month I will be looking at Britain. Britain has three levels of ham licenses. The first is the Foundation class and is somewhat similar to our Technician. The second level is the Intermediate class with content about equivalent to our General and the highest level is Advanced which is their version of the Extra. All classes have about the same privileges as far as bands and frequencies that can be used. The main difference is the maximum power they can use.

Foundation class is permitted to use 10 watts; Intermediate can use 50 watts; and Advanced can use a maximum of 400 watts. These are maximum peak envelope power levels. Also hams in Britain have a lot of frequencies that are used on a secondary basis, some that allow a maximum of 1-watt effective radiated power.

The most interesting difference between Britain and the US is in the Foundation license. As in this country, this license is designed to get hams on the air. However, they take a much more hands-on approach. First you must pass a practical exam. You are required to demonstrate making repeater, VHF/UHF simplex, and HF QSOs. You must also demonstrate you can assemble a station from component parts. This means connecting a transceiver, power supply, measuring devices (SWR meter) and an antenna into a working system. They even require that you be able to build and tune a basic antenna. Since the Foundation class can only use commercially manufactured equipment or an approved kit, this is designed to assure the ham can get on the air with minimal effort.

Another interesting requirement is to demonstrate a familiarity with Morse Code. This requires the applicant to send a short message at "any" speed. You are allowed to use a chart of codes for this transmission. You must also receive a short message at "any" speed. You can even write down the dots and dashes and translate them after the message is completed. This is designed to simply introduce code to all hams.

After completing the practical exam, you then are allowed to sit for the written 26 question test. It is basically made up of regulatory, safety and operations questions. All ham license written exams are complete using computers. When you have passed the test you will get your ticket in the post (mail).

a KEEP CALM AND

The Intermediate exam also has a practical exam that requires you demonstrate skills in basic electronics. This includes a simple soldering project that involves using components discussed in the training material. After the practical test you sit for a 45 question written. Again, this is given on a computer and if you pass you can immediately start using your new privileges including increasing power to 50 watts. The Advanced (or Full) license is a 62 question written exam. Again by computer and privileges are available immediately after passing the test. Including using the maximum power of 400 watts.



I must admit I like the practical part of the exams. Talking to some British hams, most were on the air within a couple of days using either their own, or club equipment. Also everyone I talked to belonged to a club and used the club's equipment, often weekly. As a note, the technical requirements and knowledge for these licenses were very close to ours. The license guides were very close.

Next month I will be looking at more countries.

If you plan to use your mobile while traveling in a foreign country. Remember: You are not allowed to operate unless you meet that country's visiting ham requirements. Also, to be allowed full privileges in most countries you should have an Extra class license. You are also required to follow the rules and regulations of that country while operating. Review the rules before you visit. Some countries require applying for a visiting license (i.e. Australia). Google licensing requirements for the country you plan to visit for more information.

Sylvester's title: Instructables for Hams Chapter 10, Guy Wires, EMF and the shielding effect of grapes.



Last last week I got a text from Andrew, KE8BWA that he was looking at Monday's weather and thought he would take a vacation day to play radio at West Branch. He persuaded Sylvester, KD8GGN to bring the monster magnetic loop antenna that he has been working on, for a field test. And I tagged along to see the fun and learn something.



We met a little before noon at the meadow near the boat launch and mountain bike trail, where we had set up once before. Sylvester brought the mag loop, snacks and his IC-7200. Andrew brought his KX-2, a kite and a long wire to try with the kite. I brought Norka root beer.

The mag loop setup was very quick, a one-man job, and we set to work with the KX-2, Andrew calling CQ on phone, and then switching to BPSK-31 which he operated via an app on his cell phone, USB-connected to the radio. Later he switched to using the IC-7200 with Olivia 4/250 and a laptop computer running Linux. He had an extended QSO with N7CCD in Deer Park Washington.

We learned several things. The photo shows some real no-nos. The loop antenna has a high wind load so Rick was holding the tripod to stabilize it. Probably not wise when we went from 10 watts on the KX2 to 100 W on the IC-7200, might have got a nasty RF burn if accidentally touched the copper flashing. We learned that the antenna needs to be guyed because of the wind load. We learned that on 20 meters the signal is radiating in the plane of the loop. We learned that the wide copper flashing and the large tuning capacitor provide pretty decent bandwidth on 20 meters.

Background noise at the park is very low and we were able to hear signals from Costa Rica, Germany and Italy very clearly. We were not able to work those stations at 10 watts. Later in the evening I saw on the pskreporter.info map that we were heard in Texas, as well as our Washington State QSO.

We learned that the winds were too variable that day to try lifting the long wire with the kite, but the kite flew well enough to make us think it might be feasible on a windier day.

We experimented with eating seedless grapes to evaluate the shielding effect to the person holding down the antenna, but results are inconclusive.


It was a great 3 or 4 hours outside on a beautiful day. I'd encourage you to get out in the field to play on some of these gorgeous days, even if just practicing setup and teardown on your portable equipment.

And oh, the mag loop is a real attention getter, it drew people for conversation too. We got to talk up amateur radio to some people who didn't know much about it. A good time!



We have 67 PCARS member's ham plates now, **but we can use more.** Don't have ham radio call plates on your vehicle? Well for those of you in Ohio, you can get the plates sent to you by going to any License Bureau office and filling out the special plate registration form. Have a copy of your current FCC license when you apply. The official form to obtain your Ohio Amateur Radio license plates is on the <u>PCARS Yahoo Group</u> site. Then you'll have an old plate to bring in to get hung up as a *permanent* **part of PCARS history**.

From the Ohio BMV:

<u>General Information</u>: Owners or lessees of motor vehicles who are residents of Ohio and hold an unrevoked and unexpired official amateur radio station license issued by the Federal Communications Commission may apply for these plates. The official call letters will be the license plate numbers.

<u>Registrant Eligibility</u>: Owner must submit a copy of the un-revoked and unexpired official amateur radio license issued by the Federal Communications Commission. (FCC).

<u>Title Requirements</u>: Ohio Certificate of Title issued in the same name as the FCC license, either singly or jointly, or the name on the FCC license is the same name on the lease agreement.

<u>Vehicle Information</u>: These plates may be issued to passenger vehicles, non-commercial trucks, recreational vehicles, house vehicles and non-commercial trailers.

Type of Plates: Plates will be manufactured with the FCC license.

Issuance Information: Amateur Radio plates cannot be issued with system assigned, reserved, or personalized plate formats.

Renewal of plates can be done at your local Deputy Registrar or by mail using their renewal notice. Amateur Radio License Holders must provide a copy of their current unexpired and unrevoked official amateur radio license issued by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) at the time of <u>any type renewal transaction</u>.

All plates will be mailed directly to the address on your registration card unless customer requests otherwise. The deputy will issue your registration card, stickers and provide you with a permit which will allow you to operate your vehicle while your plates are being manufactured. Special license plate applications are available at all Deputy Registrar license agency locations. These plates cost an additional \$10.00 annually plus the normal registration fees. The fee is determined by Ohio Revised Code section 4503.14.

One of the little-known facts about the Donut is exactly what that well-known shape is called, read on, and maybe you'll find out!

History of the Donut Day

The history of the donut isn't clearly known, but what is known is that their iconic look started making an appearance in the United States in the mid-1800's. Rumor has it a gentleman by the name of Hanson Gregory invented them, out of a distaste for the undercooked centers and greasiness of the existing shapes and options. The shape was said to be obtained by punching a hole in the center with a tin pepper box.

There are many varieties of donuts outside of that most commonly known, including twist donuts, fritters, and the hugely varied and popular filled donut. Filled donuts come in a huge variety, including the very popular Devil Dog, a chocolate covered delight filled with a rich cream. Glazed donuts filled with all sorts of delicious fruit, with raspberry being a runaway favorite throughout the world, and lemon filling being an equally popular.

How to Celebrate Doughnut Day

Doughnut Day came to pass, in part, due to the efforts of a doctor in the military in the first World War who sought to brighten the day of the wounded soldiers he worked on. On his first day to the Military Base, he purchased 8 dozen doughnuts and gave one to each soldier he worked on.

After giving one to Lieutenant General Samuel Geary, who received it with great mirth and appreciation for the doctors

work, Samuel decided to start a fundraiser, letting the young doctor, Morgan Pett, to continue to provide doughnuts to his patients.

The Salvation Army sent 250 volunteers to France to help put these huts together, which soon became a mainstay of military life. One record of a day in the huts recorded up to 300 donuts and 700 cups of coffee being served as part of their service. Due to the majority of the workers being female, the Salvation Army workers started to be known as "Doughnut Dollies."

A great way to celebrate Donut Day is to volunteer to help this amazing organization on the day they've held for years in support of our armed forces. Just a few hours of your time or a donation towards their organization will ensure they continue to be able to do their good work the world round!

10th June, 2018 will be... Iced Tea Day

They're simple to make at home, and while a deep fryer is great, it isn't essential in their preparation. 
