From Nuts & Volts: Wire Wrap Is alive And Well!

"Quick note about Wire Wrap. I first ran into this in 1972 when I was in the Navy and assigned to Hughes Aircraft in Los Angeles working on the new F-14 TomCat computer and radar systems to be introduced into the Navy. All the back planes (card racks) in the computer & radar boxes were wire wrapped. My first thought was this will never survive hard deck landings on an aircraft carrier. My next 6 years while in VX-4 and VF-143 - I never saw a single failure or intermittant problem caused by a wire wrap. That convinced me that wire wrap is very reliable. Later at Tecnicare - A MRI/CT Scanner/Nuclear Medicine Scanner manufacturer - the back planes of all the card racks were also wire wrapped." -Parky, KB8UUZ

Well, this month turned out to be a bit more active than first thought.

Once Field Day was over, I was happy to get away for some time at one of our beautiful Ohio State Parks. I was ready to just relax, and stay away from the radio. Our destination this time was Mosquito Lake SP (US-1978). Yep, my time away from the radio didn't last long. While there for the Independence Day weekend, I managed a couple activations, and lots of fun!

The next couple weeks included occasional small trips to West Branch SP (US-1999), and Wingfoot Lake SP (US-3516). Then, I heard from Tim, AA4SS, who lives in VA. He visits family in the area often, and we take a day to head out for a rove. The rules are simple; a day trip to new-to-us parks.

Since we've both done a good job of activating parks in Ohio, we headed to Pennsylvania for the day. I had 5 parks left to go in Lawrence County, PA. So that was the target for this trip. We managed to hit all 5, and a 6th in Southern Mercer County just because we discovered it as we were driving by.

We ran 100W SSB into both an EFHW for the first couple stops, and a Linked dipole at the rest. I refer to this type of activation as "Tailgate portable". We managed 132 contacts over 6 POTA locations; one was a Two-fer, where the North Country National Scenic Trail (US-4239) passes through PA State Game Land 148 (US-8846).

That is almost it for this month, but I have I have a new website to pass along. This comes from Tim, AA4SS. http://map.pota.ninja/? uses information available from the POTA database to display a customized map of your POTA progress. I don't think that it's perfect yet, but does show a lot of promise. I'm not sure who's building it, but it looks like a cool site to bookmark. I'll be watching the progress. And now that is all we have for this month. Get out there and activate something!








On Air Activity Graph K8BF





The Portage County Amateur Radio Service, Inc. (PCARS) announces the **18th Annual "Ohio State Parks On the Air"** (OSPOTA) contest, from the hours of 10 am to 6 pm EST (1400 UTC to 2200 UTC).

18 th OSPOTA - September 6, 2025 19 th OSPOTA - September 12, 2026 20 th OSPOTA - September 11, 2027 Always the first Saturday after the Labor Day holiday.

For hams throughout the State of Ohio, this is your opportunity to visit and enjoy the amenities offered by the 76 beautiful State Parks here in Ohio. Don't just make a day of it - spend the weekend at the park of your choice. No matter whether you are camping or staying at one of the outstanding lodges or resorts, you will find that the parks are one of Ohio's greatest assets. In past years, hundreds of Amateur Radio Operators (hams) from around the country participated in the event. With the success of OSPOTA, we hope to have amateur radio operators at every Ohio State Park.

This contest places a premium on working stations located in the Ohio State Parks. That means that it is critical to have as many parks activated as possible. The challenge for Ohio stations will be to work HF in the 50 to 300 mile range. This is the perfect opportunity to learn more about the design and deployment of Near Vertical Incident Skywave (NVIS) antennas. You can find numerous designs on the Internet and in various Amateur Radio antenna manuals. Along with your operating skills, it will be a chance to showcase your antenna building skills as well.

Individuals and multiple operators can operate Ohio State Park stations. Non-park stations in Ohio as well as stations outside of Ohio can also compete.

Contacts can be made on 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 meters using SSB and CW. All contacts have the same point values.

Make sure that you read the Rules, FAQ's and get your forms for the contest that are posted on the OSPOTA website: https://www.ospota.org/ before the contest.

Eighteenth Annual Ohio State Parks On The Air – Amateur Radio Contest

Make sure to mark your calendar for the 2024 Ohio State Parks On The Air (OSPOTA) contest – September 6, 2025. The contest is always held on the first Saturday following the Labor Day holiday. Each year this event has grown and we anticipate another year of growth with even more participating Amateur Radio Operators.

Let me remind you that the OSPOTA contest was conceived with three main goals in mind:

- To promote public awareness of amateur radio and Ohio's beautiful state parks system;
- To contribute to the recognition that Ohio has a very diverse and wonderful ecology;
- To promote camaraderie within the ranks of Ohio's Amateur Radio Operators

Your participation has allowed these goals to be achieved. We agree it is a lot of fun to get out in a natural setting with your radio and see how well you can do at working operators in the beautiful Ohio State Parks.

This will be the 18th annual OSPOTA – Make plans now to be active in OSPOTA 2025. Don't forget – we have an OSPOTA IO Group located at: https://groups.io/g/OSPOTA

The OSPOTA IO Group page is used for messaging and sharing of information about OSPOTA for all the fans and participants in the OSPOTA contest. The E-mail Group is where the action is. Since we do allow spotting to encourage more contacts during OSPOTA, Facebook is being used before and during the contest for instant updates and to share stories and photos.

As the contest draws near, we'll be posting on the OSPOTA E-mail Group page the anticipated 'who's going to be at what Ohio State Park' or 'Planned Park' list as we have in past years. Send your planned park activation information to PlannedParks@ospota.org. Please, include the call sign that will be used and the Ohio State Park you plan to be at. If your plans change, just let us know and we'll update the list. Remember, more than one person or group can be at an Ohio State Park – there are no reserved State Parks.

Notes: Some Ohio State Parks are being managed by local park systems, but they are still listed and considered to be Ohio State Parks according to ODNR (Quail Hollow & Tinkers Creek).

At this point, there are 76 Ohio State Parks open for 2025. ODNR reports the new Great Council Ohio State Park (76th Ohio State Park) located between Xenia and Yellow Springs is open.

So – pick a park and make your plans now for OSPOTA 2025 !!!!!!






PCARS Field Day 2025 Flex Station Review

Flex Station Field Day operations for 2025 were very good. Before talking about the results for the Flex Station, I want to thank and acknowledge the people who volunteered to operate at Flex, all of whom did an outstanding job. In several cases some operators volunteered for multiple shifts to make sure we could maximize our performance at Flex. Sincere thanks go out to Bob N8QE, Ken WA8LRW, Agnes AD8IR, Ben AD8FQ, Rick KD8WCK, Mike KP4VZ, Gene W8NET, and John KE8MXR.




Their efforts supported PCARS having another outstanding Field Day. I also want to thank those who volunteered to help set up and tear down at the Flex Station. Your efforts helped get the station operational in a very timely manner.

The Flex Station again had a record-breaking year in the number of QSO's made, as you can see in the table and graphs in Figure 1. Due to a technical problem during the first shift of Field Day, we were only able to make 4 QSO's. Had the issue not occurred we would have broken 600 digital QSO's at Flex this year. Figures 2 through 4 highlight operational statistics at the Flex Station.

Despite a modest increase in contacts what is important to take away is that each year we do two things, increase our performance, and recognize and learn from our successes and failures so that we can improve our performance in the following year. This year we added a training event to help increase operator proficiency using FT8 and FT4 digital modes. The first Saturday of June, Ken WA8LRW held a training event at the club site on how to use WSJT-X to maximize contacts in the contesting mode for FT4 and FT8. After the training concluded everyone participated in the ARRL International Digital Contest to use the knowledge gained in the training to polish contesting skills. Ken WA8LRW and Bob N8QE were roving between operators to help them during the contest. The training and contest, being very similar to digital operations during Field Day and taking place within three weeks of Field Day, were valuable in increasing operator contest proficiency.



Linked Dipole Group Build

A few weeks back, a small group of us got together on a Saturday morning to learn about Linked Dipoles. This is a multi-band antenna that can be used on multiple bands, depending on how you have your band jumpers set. I have a few of them already, but on this particular day, we were building 3-band versions that will work on 20M, 30M, & 40M. The theory behind them is pretty simple. Once you've built one, you'll get ideas for other versions to build.



Linked Dipoles can be purchased from several sources, but building one is so much less expensive, and a whole lot more fun!

We built them one band at a time, testing as we went. By lunchtime, all four builders has successfully completed their new antennas.





Transitioning from Windows 10 to Linux

Microsoft's announcement regarding the termination of support for Windows 10 in October 2025 has created significant concern within the computing communities. After this date, users will no longer get security updates or bug fixes. This lack of ongoing support makes Windows 10 systems attractive targets for cybercriminals. The most popular Linux distributions (often referred to as 'distros') today are well-developed, user-friendly, and often match the sophistication of Windows or macOS.



Linux offers a practical option: keep your existing PC, safeguard your privacy, and enjoy consistent updates from engaged global communities. Linux Mint has consistently been at the forefront of beginner-friendliness for several years. Built on the reliable Ubuntu foundation, Mint comes with all the necessary tools that an average user needs: a complete office suite, multimedia codecs, and a user-friendly desktop that resembles Windows 7. The Cinnamon desktop interface emulates the Windows 'Start Menu' layout, ensuring that users seldom feel disoriented.

Trying Linux Before You Commit

Most popular distributions enable you to "test drive" the system straight from a bootable USB stick without affecting your internal storage. This "live mode" starts a fully operational desktop from the USB, providing a safe way to explore.

Linux Installation

For those just starting out, I highly suggest beginning with Linux Mint (linuxmint.com). Its user-friendly interfaces and comprehensive documentation make it perfect for grasping the basics.

Linux Mint is available in three distinct versions, each offering a unique desktop environment.

Cinnamon – The most modern, innovative and full-featured desktop

MATE - A more traditional, and faster desktop

Xfce - The most lightweight desktop

Installation steps:

- 1. Download the ISO image: Head over to the official website (linuxmint.com) and download the correct ISO image for your computer's architecture.
- 2. Create a bootable USB drive or DVD: You'll require a tool such as Rufus (Windows), Etcher (Windows, macOS, Linux), or the built-in disk utility on macOS to generate a bootable installation media from the downloaded ISO image. This step involves transferring the ISO image onto your USB drive or DVD, making it bootable.
- 3. Boot from the installation media: Restart your computer and access the BIOS/UEFI settings (usually by pressing Delete, F2, F10, or F12 during startup the specific key depends on your motherboard). Adjust the boot order to prioritize your USB drive or DVD. Save your changes and exit. Your computer will now boot from the installation media.

- 4. Follow the on-screen instructions: The installation process is typically straightforward. You will be guided through selecting your language, keyboard layout, partitioning your hard drive (this can be a bit tricky, so pay close attention!), creating a user account, and choosing your preferred software. You can set up Linux alongside Windows: This process is known as dual booting Linux with Windows. In this setup, you install Linux on a computer that already has Windows installed. When you start your computer, you can select whether to use Windows or Linux. However, before proceeding, you need to disable BitLocker and turn off Fast Startup in the power settings.
- 5. Post-installation setup: After the installation is complete, reboot your computer and log in using the username and password you set up.

Installing 73linux - Ham Radio apps installer

So, what is Linux useful for without Ham Radio applications such as WSJT-X, GridTracker, and FLRig, among others?

I discovered a Ham Radio apps installer compiled by KM4ACK called 73Linux. This installer allows you to choose the applications you want to install and skip the ones you don't need. This keeps your system as lean and mean as possible.

From the terminal run the following command:

git clone https://github.com/km4ack/73Linux.git \$HOME/73Linux && bash \$HOME/73Linux/73.sh

If the above command fails, you may be missing git. If so, run

sudo apt install git

and then run the git clone command again.



As a huge linux nerd, I was excited to hear about a new distro (another term for linux operating system "flavor") called ArcOS. It stands for Amateur Radio Community Operating System. The idea is for a live session via USB that works out of the box on (generally) any modern computer. It is based off of Linux Mint (best distro if you ask me) and is fairly light on hardware demands compared to Windows or MacOS.



ArcOS is aimed at digirig, and you can pay a small fee and get VARA (\$50 since it's not open source) and it does have other amateur radio software. The project was built for casual or EMCOM use, which has the potential for many uses.

Go fish out an old unused 16gb flash drive and play around with it on LiveUSB, it wont damage your current OS or files.

You will need to provide an ORIGINAL copy of your amateur radio license, and if you have one, your DMR ID. You also provide your name and email address.

AmateurWire will work with the GroundWire client for Android and iOS phones but there is an initial fee to purchase it.

My AmateurWire extension is 1577, and my HamsOverIP extension is 101797. You do NOT need "a hard phone" to use it, as the GroundWire app will take care of it, and you don't need an external headset mic to work with it.




break this down into small bites and keep the presentations short, so we have lots of time for antenna questions.

PCARS Ham Radio License Plates Wanted!

Dig out that amateur radio call sign license plate (with your present call sign), clean it up and bring it to be permanently affixed to the wall in the PCARS club station!

We have over 80 PCARS member's ham plates now, **but we can use more**. Don't have ham radio call plates on your vehicle? Well for those of you in Ohio, you can get the plates sent to you by going to any License Bureau office and filling out the special plate registration form. Have a copy of your current FCC license when you apply. The official form to obtain your Ohio Amateur Radio license plates is on the PCARS IO Group site. Then you'll have an old plate to bring in to get hung up as a *permanent* part of **PCARS history**.



From the Ohio BMV:

General Information: Owners or lessees of motor vehicles who are residents of Ohio and hold an unrevoked and unexpired official amateur radio station license issued

by the Federal Communications Commission may apply for these plates. The official call letters will be the license plate numbers.

Registrant Eligibility: Owner must submit a copy of the un-revoked and unexpired official amateur radio license issued by the Federal Communications Commission. (FCC).

<u>Title Requirements:</u> Ohio Certificate of Title issued in the same name as the FCC license, either singly or jointly, or the name on the FCC license is the same name on the lease agreement.

<u>Vehicle Information:</u> These plates may be issued to passenger vehicles, non-commercial trucks, recreational vehicles, house vehicles and non-commercial trailers.

Type of Plates: Plates will be manufactured with the FCC license.

<u>Issuance Information:</u> Amateur Radio plates cannot be issued with system assigned, reserved, or personalized plate formats.

Renewal of plates can be done at your local Deputy Registrar or by mail using their renewal notice. Amateur Radio License Holders must provide a copy of their current unexpired and unrevoked official amateur radio license issued by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) at the time of <u>any type renewal transaction</u>.


All plates will be mailed directly to the address on your registration card. The deputy will issue your registration card, stickers and provide you with a permit which will allow you to operate your vehicle while your plates are being manufactured. Special license plate applications are available at all Deputy Registrar license agency locations. These plates cost an additional \$10.00 annually plus the normal registration fees. The fee is determined by Ohio Revised Code section 4503.14.

Okay - Now All the Details:

- If you are sick, have a cough, a high temperature or have been exposed to COVID-19 or other communicable germs, or someone that has been infected please, *do not* come to the club site. *Use of masks is optional*.
- · No food or snacks allowed.
- · Ensure you have the following:
- · A picture ID such as a valid Driver's License, State ID, School ID, or US Passport.
- If you are under 16 years of age, a parent or guardian must be able to vouch for you and you need a copy of your birth certificate (you do not have to give us a copy, we just have to see and verify).
- If you are upgrading to General or Extra You MUST bring your original valid amateur radio license and a copy of your valid amateur radio license to turn in with your Form 605.
- · Calculators are okay to use (if you need one) as long as the memories are cleared.
- · NO cell Phones allowed.

First-Time Exam Applicants MUST Obtain FCC Registration Number BEFORE Taking Exam - All amateur examination applicants are required to provide an FCC Registration Number (FRN) to the Volunteer Examiners (VEs) BEFORE taking an amateur exam. This is necessary due to changes the FCC has made to its licensing system. Applicants will create an FCC username and account, respond to the verification email from FCC, and then register for the FRN. Register on the FCC's Commission Registration System (CORES): https://apps.fcc.gov/cores/

Email Addresses REQUIRED - All applications are required to contain an email address for FCC correspondence. Applicants will receive an email direct from the FCC with a link to the official electronic copy of their license whenever a license is issued or changed. ARRL VEC suggests that those without access to email to use the email address of a family member or friend. Licensees will be able to log in to the ULS using their FRN and password to download the latest version of their license at any time. The FCC no longer provides paper license documents via regular mail.

FCC - \$35 Amateur Application Fee - The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) staff has clarified in response to an ARRL request that the new \$35 application fee will **not apply** to **upgrade to an amateur radio licensee's operator class and changes to club station trustees**. The new fees will apply only to applications for a **new** license, **renewal**, rule waiver, or a **new vanity call sign**.

VECs and Volunteer Examiner (VE) teams will <u>not</u> collect the \$35 fee at exam sessions. New applicants will pay the \$15 exam session fee to the ARRL VE team as usual.

When the FCC receives the examination information from the VEC, it will email a link with payment instructions to each successful candidate. The candidate will have **10 calendar days**, from the date of the application file number being issued, to pay. After the fee is paid, and the FCC has processed an application, examinees will receive a second email from the FCC with a link to their official license. The link will be good for 30 days.

Youth Licensing Grant Program - The ARRL Youth Licensing Grant Program, in effect since April 19, 2022, will cover the one-time \$35 application fee for **new** amateur radio license candidates **17 years old or younger** for tests administered under the ARRL Volunteer Examiner Coordinator (VEC) program. The \$35 Federal Communications Commission (FCC) application fee will be reimbursed after the ARRL VEC receives the completed reimbursement form and after the new license has been issued. The reimbursement check will be mailed to the fee payer. Also, candidates 17 years old or younger would pay a reduced exam session fee of \$5 to the ARRL VE team at the time of the exam. The \$5 fee is for all candidates 17 years old or younger, regardless of the exam level taken. Proof of under 18 status is required.

Printing Your FCC License

As of February 17, 2015, the **FCC no longer routinely issues paper license documents** to Amateur Radio applicants and licensees. The Commission has maintained for some time now that the official Amateur Radio license authorization is the electronic record that exists in its Universal Licensing System (ULS). The FCC will continue to provide paper license documents to all licensees who notify the Commission that they prefer to receive one.

Licensees also will be able to print out an official authorization — as well as an unofficial "reference copy" — from the ULS License Manager.
