I understand that as you get older, missing key events do to health issues becomes more probable. This time it was work on my eyes. The whole process requires limitations of fun things for 6 weeks. What a drag. I am looking forward to getting back into the swing of all things ham radio

#### Project Fun

During this down time, I have been allowed to play with a couple of projects. The first was duplicating an antenna project documented by Reinhard Nibler DC1YY in one of my favorite ham radio mags SPRAT. He built a UNUN with multiple taps for 1:1, 1:4, 1:9 and 1:16 ratios. He uses this to connect various lengths of wire for portable operations. This allows for much better matches without tuners for more bands. Hope to get it tested after my last procedure. If you aren't already a subscriber and are interested in QRP, you should give SPRAT a look.

The second project comes from Dave KO4YLZ. He is a big fan of SOTA and came up with a gadget that makes using his EndFed better. It is basically a radio-controlled relay that allows a change to the length of the antenna. Using his idea allows him to add 30 meters to his available bands and makes the efficiency of his setup better. It is a project that takes 20 minutes to build and works great. I have tried it and removed the need for my tuner for most bands. This might make a great build. Cost is about \$15.

#### <u>Outreach</u>

On June 7<sup>th</sup> with the help of the Wagner gang we setup at Lock 3 in Akron as part of the Polymer Palooza STEM event. Turnout was great. As a result of that event, I have received 31 emails requesting information on ham radio. That is a great result. Even Zippy from Akron University sent me an email asking for more information.

#### <u>Events</u>

We have some great speakers and events lined up. In July we

have Ward Silver N0AX talking about EndFed designs and in August we have Don Dubon N6JRL talking about the HD8G DXpedition. We also have a great build scheduled for July 12<sup>th</sup>. This build setup by John WG8X will build a linked dipole antenna. Lots to look forward over the next couple of months.





## On The Road with WG8X

Hello everyone, Hope your Field Day was perfect. As I'm writing this, Field Day is still a few days off, and I'm praying for good weather; not too hot, and no storms.

This month, I wanted to give a recap of my adventures at Beaver Creek SP (US-1935).

Two months ago, I camped there for a weekend in order to finish out my Kilo (1000 contacts from a park). While it was a great weekend for camping; not so much for radio. Propagation was horrible, so no Kilo then.

Fast forward to Father's Day weekend, and the wife was out of town, so I decided to try it again. My goals for this trip had expanded somewhat. I was still chasing

the Kilo, but had some other things going on too.


I wound up at a non-electric campsite this time. I have a buddy who has set up his rig for off-the-grid camping; no electric. I thought this would be a good time to assess my off-grid capabilities. I have one camper battery that doesn't run the radio; just the camper systems. For the radio, I had my 12AH and 20AH Lithium batteries charged and ready to go. Since I rarely use more than 30W power, my hope was that they would be sufficient for the long weekend.

My goals for the weekend were:

1) Finish my Kilo – I was about 200 contacts shy of my goal.

2) Build a Linked Dipole for 6m/10m/15m - 6 Meters had been pretty active in the days leading up to this trip, so I set a goal of building/testing the antenna on-site.

3) Finishing my N1CC award – N1CC is pretty involved. It requires that we activate on 10 bands at 10 different parks. Since my campsite was less than 100ft from the North Country National Scenic Trail (US-4239), it counted as a Two-fer, and finishing N1CC at both parks was a real possibility.





In order to finish N1CC, I needed 60M; a band I had done only once. So a lot of reading went into this. Thank God for good cell coverage.

While the goals for the weekend were achieved, I also learned a few things.


First, One medium size camper battery is insufficient for a prolonged off-grid camping trip. I have a 750W inverter generator that is barely sufficient for charging the camper battery. In the future, I'd like to upgrade to dual 100W Lithium batteries for the camper, and supplement with solar cells.

Second, while the radios run off of 12V, not so much for the laptop. I was forced to either charge it from the inverter in my truck, or start up the generator in order to charge the laptop. I didn't like either of those options. While I can log on paper, FT8 is difficult to do without a computer. So I'll be investigating 12 charging options for the laptop.

Third, I really like the hitch mount option for the rear of the camper. I have a Camco flag mount that fits into the hitch receiver. From there, I can mount my Spiderbeam mast to support wire antennas. I can also use this setup attached to the truck.

That's it for this month. Remember to stay hydrated, and have fun out there.

### Tech Tip: Quickly Measuring A Large Number Of Batteries

I recently had to measure approximately 120 batteries to determine which were usable and which needed to be recycled.

The selection included various sizes: C cells, D cells, AA, AAA, and a significant number of those pesky coin cells, which test your patience while trying to ensure good contact without having the coin cell fly across the room.

My solution was to place the batteries on a piece of copper-coated PCB board, with one of their electrodes (the negative one) touching the copper surface.

I attached the negative lead from my multimeter to the copper surface. Then, I could easily move the positive lead from one battery to the next, allowing me to set up and measure selections of about ten batteries in record time.

Measuring the coin cell batteries has become a non-issue, as shown in the picture.

After that, I decided to keep a smaller piece of copper-coated PCB board on hand for when I need to measure just one or two batteries.

I hope this is helpful.

Digital communication with a radio has been an interest since I decided to get back into amateur radio, choosing to start with email using Winlink. The Winlink website (https://Winlink.org/) describes it like this:

Winlink Global Radio Email is a network of amateur radio and authorized government stations that provide worldwide radio email using radio pathways where the internet is not present. The system is built, operated and administered entirely by licensed "Ham" volunteers. It supports email with attachments, position reporting, weather and information bulletins, and is well-known for its role in interoperable emergency and disaster relief communications. It is capable of operating completely without the internet--automatically--using smart-network radio relays. Licensed Winlink operators/stations use both amateur radio and government radio frequencies worldwide. Support for the system is provided by the Amateur Radio Safety Foundation, Inc., a US 501(c)(3) non-profit, public-benefit entity. Winlink Global Radio Email is a US registered trademark of the Amateur Radio Safety Foundation, Inc. (From the Winlink website.)

Simply speaking, Winlink provides a capability to send email via radio. This article is not a how-to download, install or use the software; it is just an example of one type of digital communication available at a fairly low cost and nets based on it. There are a great many capabilities but this article only touches on using it for email without the internet. I started using Winlink a few months ago so am not an expert, but simply an amateur radio operator enjoying the challenges that participating in the nets affords. I have no affiliation with Winlink, just a simple user.

Preparation is critical in the event of an emergency such as occurred at Chimney Rock, North Carolina where the town was washed away by hurricane Helene in 2024 and normal phone or internet communication were unavailable for an extended time. Winlink could have assisted with communication. I do not know if it did, only that it would have been another tool in the toolbox for disaster communication along with HF/VHF/UHF operators. Many of the nets are affiliated with EmComm organizations. These nets offer weekly challenges or questions in order to demonstrate capabilities within the software and maintain or improve skill levels of those associated with EmComm. It is those challenges suggested that are most enjoyable.

As the name suggests, it is a Microsoft Windows executable program. It can run on Linux or IOS systems with Windows emulators but it has not been attempted by me. It is a free download but speed limited unless a registration key is purchased for \$24. It can be used on HF and VHF/UHF bands. My setup includes a Windows laptop, Digirig interface and mobile VHF/UHF band radio. The radio does not have CAT control, yet Winlink operates through the radio seamlessly with a simple push of a button in the software. Email can be sent or received through RMS gateways or the internet. There are several local RMS gateways in the Portage, Summit and Stark county area. These can be easily found within the software.

Some but not all of the capabilities of Winlink are:

- Email thru transceiver or internet (telnet)
- · Standard forms or custom can be created
- · Attachments allowed including images
- · Images can be reduced in size directly in the software
- Position reporting
- · Weather bulletins (send and receive weather information)
- Message relay and peer-to-peer
- Message size limited to 120kb

- Address book
- · Easy setup Automatic or manual updates
- Open source

There are many forms and templates available within the program as shown in the image below. Some of the organizations that conduct Winlink nets have their own forms, some use the standard forms. Some nets occur on a specific weekday or several days, some run for an entire week. This allows a more leisurely approach to participation. They generally provide both an invitation and confirmation at the end of their net. A few of the single day and multi day nets are provided in the tables below. The original Winlink Wednesday "KN4LQN" (NCS) is a single day net that request the emails through RF and not internet. "GLAWN" (NCS), for example, generally offers an optional exercise and runs for 6 days (Monday though Saturday). Completing the option and providing the correct format and information will generate a "perfect score" return message. "K7ACT" (NCS) runs Tuesday through Monday and offers a guestion each week, often either EmComm or amateur radio related. Many offer peer-to-peer submissions in addition to submitting messages through a gateway. Some offer maps of the participants (e.g., https://www.qsl.net/kw4shp/ WinlinkWed/WWmap.html). Operators from other countries often participate in the nets as well. There are many more Winlink nets, these are just a few to demonstrate the geographic diversity.


#### From SM6NT (QRZ page)




Morse Code

## July Group Build

Our linked dipole build is coming up on Saturday, July 12<sup>th</sup>. This will be from 9am– 12 Noon.

A linked dipole is a multi-band dipole where the radiator is cut into sections, and the bands are changed by connecting or disconnecting the proper sections.

I have a few of these, and love the simplicity of them. They're easy to build. No soldering; all the connections are done using crimped PowerPole connectors. We'll be using 18 gauge silicone wire, which is less prone to tangling. With the exception of the center insulator, all insulators are 3D printed.

The cost is \$50 (\$51.52 via Paypal). Since I'm printing the parts, I need an accurate count of participants by **July 5**<sup>th</sup>. You can register on our website at portcars.org. That net exceeded all expectations and I believe that the weekly net has been one of the hallmarks that makes PCARS such an outstanding Amateur Radio Club! Now, as we finish up our first *twenty-years* as a club, I wanted to offer up a challenge to everyone to not only celebrate our 2oth anniversary, but also earn some recognition within the club. The participation of our members in our activities is first and foremost what sets us apart from other clubs and makes us such an outstanding organization! With that I give you the "20 for 20" PCARS Net awards:

The award period will run from July 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025. There will be a PCARS net every Thursday evening during the award period EXCEPT July 3rd, November 27th and December 25th. Therefore, there are 23 nets you can check into to qualify for the award. In addition, all 4 nets in June 2025 are considered "bonus" nets, and you can use up to 2 of them that you checked into to count for nets you miss during the award period.

There are 3 awards:

1. "20th Anniversary 10 in a row" awarded for any 10 in a row check-ins during the award period. Up to two "Bonus" nets can be used for this award.

2. "20 for 20" awarded for 20 check-ins during the award period. Up to two "Bonus" nets can be used for this award.

3. "All 23 for PCARS Special 20th" is awarded for all 23 qualifying nets during the award period. Up to two "Bonus" nets can be used for this award.



Big Thanks Mike for the fantastic job he has done on the website over the last couple years.


So what's ahead? I'll have more info in the coming months, but for now, let's just get through Field Day.

HINTS: 1) clean up your old laptop, 2) get an empty microSD card ready.




As before, we will try to accommodate all who show up but since we really can't schedule times for specific ops, we simply ask you to be patient if the op positions are filled when you show up.


We did look briefly at the upcoming contests in the next few months which of course includes the Ohio QSO Party along with our yearly Open House and BBQ.







## Dig out that amateur radio call sign license plate (with your present call sign), clean it up and bring it to be permanently affixed to the wall in the PCARS club station!

We have over 80 PCARS member's ham plates now, **but we can use more**. Don't have ham radio call plates on your vehicle? Well for those of you in Ohio, you can get the plates sent to you by going to any License Bureau office and filling out the special plate registration form. Have a copy of your current FCC license when you apply. The official form to obtain your Ohio Amateur Radio license plates is on the PCARS IO Group site. Then you'll have an old plate to bring in to get hung up as a *permanent* part of **PCARS history**.



From the Ohio BMV:

**General Information:** Owners or lessees of motor vehicles who are residents of Ohio and hold an unrevoked and unexpired official amateur radio station license issued by the Federal Communications Commission may apply for these plates. The official call letters will be the license plate numbers.

**<u>Registrant Eligibility</u>**: Owner must submit a copy of the un-revoked and unexpired official amateur radio license issued by the Federal Communications Commission. (FCC).

<u>Title Requirements</u>: Ohio Certificate of Title issued in the same name as the FCC license, either singly or jointly, or the name on the FCC license is the same name on the lease agreement.

Vehicle Information: These plates may be issued to passenger vehicles, non-commercial trucks, recreational vehicles, house vehicles and non-commercial trailers.

Type of Plates: Plates will be manufactured with the FCC license.

**Issuance Information:** Amateur Radio plates cannot be issued with system assigned, reserved, or personalized plate formats.

Renewal of plates can be done at your local Deputy Registrar or by mail using their renewal notice. Amateur Radio License Holders must provide a copy of their current unexpired and unrevoked official amateur radio license issued by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) at the time of <u>any type renewal transaction</u>.


All plates will be mailed directly to the address on your registration card. The deputy will issue your registration card, stickers and provide you with a permit which will allow you to operate your vehicle while your plates are being manufactured. Special license plate applications are available at all Deputy Registrar license agency locations. These plates cost an additional \$10.00 annually plus the normal registration fees. The fee is determined by Ohio Revised Code section 4503.14.



- 17 years old or younger? VE Fee is \$5 per the ARRL reduced CE fee Youth Program
- · 17 years old or younger? ARRL will reimburse you the \$35 FCC Fee

#### Okay - Now All the Details:

- If you are sick, have a cough, a high temperature or have been exposed to COVID-19 or other communicable germs, or someone that has been infected please, *do not* come to the club site. *Use of masks is optional*.
- · No food or snacks allowed.
- · Ensure you have the following:
- · A picture ID such as a valid Driver's License, State ID, School ID, or US Passport.
- If you are under 16 years of age, a parent or guardian must be able to vouch for you and you need a copy of your birth certificate (you do not have to give us a copy, we just have to see and verify).
- If you are upgrading to General or Extra You MUST bring your original valid amateur radio license and a copy of your valid amateur radio license to turn in with your Form 605.
- · Calculators are okay to use (if you need one) as long as the memories are cleared.
- NO cell Phones allowed.

First-Time Exam Applicants <u>MUST</u> Obtain FCC Registration Number <u>BEFORE</u> Taking Exam - All amateur examination applicants are required to provide an FCC Registration Number (FRN) to the Volunteer Examiners (VEs) <u>BEFORE</u> taking an amateur exam. This is necessary due to changes the FCC has made to its licensing system. Applicants will create an FCC username and account, respond to the verification email from FCC, and then register for the FRN. Register on the FCC's Commission Registration System (CORES): <u>https://apps.fcc.gov/cores/</u>



**Email Addresses <u>REQUIRED</u>** All applications are required to contain an email address for FCC correspondence. Applicants will receive an email direct from the FCC with a link to the official electronic copy of their license whenever a license is issued or changed. ARRL VEC suggests that those without access to email to use the email address of a family member or friend. Licensees will be able to log in to the ULS using their FRN and password to download the latest version of their license at any time. The FCC no longer provides paper license documents via regular mail.

FCC - \$35 Amateur Application Fee - The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) staff has clarified in response to an ARRL request that the new \$35 application fee will not apply to upgrade to an amateur radio licensee's operator class and changes to club station trustees. The new fees will apply only to applications for a new license, renewal, rule waiver, or a new vanity call sign.

VECs and Volunteer Examiner (VE) teams will not collect the \$35 fee at exam sessions. New applicants will pay the \$15 exam session fee to the ARRL VE team as usual.

When the FCC receives the examination information from the VEC, it will email a link with payment instructions to each successful candidate. The candidate will have **10 calendar days**, from the date of the application file number being issued, to pay. After the fee is paid, and the FCC has processed an application, examinees will receive a second email from the FCC with a link to their official license. The link will be good for 30 days.

Youth Licensing Grant Program - The ARRL Youth Licensing Grant Program, in effect since April 19, 2022, will cover the one-time \$35 application fee for **new** amateur radio license candidates **17 years old or younger** for tests administered under the ARRL Volunteer Examiner Coordinator (VEC) program. The \$35 Federal Communications Commission (FCC) application fee will be reimbursed after the ARRL VEC receives the completed reimbursement form and after the new license has been issued. The reimbursement check will be mailed to the fee payer. Also, candidates 17 years old or younger would pay a reduced exam session fee of \$5 to the ARRL VE team at the time of the exam. The \$5 fee is for all candidates 17 years old or younger, regardless of the exam level taken. Proof of under 18 status is required.

## Printing Your FCC License

#### Information provided by Anthony Luscre, K8ZT

As of February 17, 2015, the **FCC no longer routinely issues paper license documents** to Amateur Radio applicants and licensees. The Commission has maintained for some time now that the official Amateur Radio license authorization is the electronic record that exists in its Universal Licensing System (ULS). The FCC will continue to provide paper license documents to all licensees who notify the Commission that they prefer to receive one.

Licensees also will be able to print out an official authorization — as well as an unofficial "reference copy" — from the ULS License Manager.
