




From the ARRL Ohio Section Manager

This jamboree requires no travel other than to a nearby amateur radio operator's ham shack. Face masks are not State/County mandated at this time, but you are always welcome to wear one.

PCARS VE sessions are scheduled for **10:00 am** on the first Saturday of every even numbered month at the PCARS club site in Ravenna. **WALK-INS will be accepted.**

QUICK FACTS

- Yes, PCARS VE test Sessions are held at the club site in Ravenna starting at 10 am see schedule.
- Walk-Ins are accepted. Would appreciate an email to KB8UUZ@GMAIL.COM if you plan on attending.
- You MUST have an FRN Number (SSNs no longer accepted)
- You MUST have a valid e-mail address for the FCC to be able to contact you.
- Picture ID required
- Original and Copy of your valid FCC license and originals of any applicable CSCE
- Taking Technician Test? You MUST apply for your FRN and get it prior to testing.
- **VE fee is \$15** Cash or Check payable to "ARRL-VEC"
- Under 18 years old? VE Fee is \$5 per the ARRL reduced CE fee Youth Program
- FCC License Fee \$35 payable after FCC send you a link. DOES NOT APPLY to upgrades.
- Under 18? ARRL will reimburse you the \$35 FCC Fee.

Okay - now all the Details:

- You must have your FRN prior to taking an exam No SSNs will be used on the Form 605 anymore.
- If you are sick, have a cough, a high temperature or have been exposed to COVID-19 or someone that has been infected please, do not come to the club site. Use of masks is still encouraged.
- No food or snacks allowed.
- \$15.00 Fee Payment will only be by check or exact change. We cannot make change
- If paying by check, make check out to: "ARRL-VEC" The VE Fee is \$15.00 (see below)
- Ensure you have the following:
 - o A picture ID such as a valid Driver's License, State ID, School ID, or US Passport.
 - If you are under 16 years of age, a parent or guardian must be able to vouch for you and you need a copy of your birth certificate (you do not have to give us a copy, we just have to see and verify).
 - o FCC is requiring you have your e-mail address on the Form 605.
 - If you are taking a Technician test you must have your FRN number (you can apply for an FRN on the FCC website). For hams having a license, your FRN is printed on your license.
 - o <u>If you are upgrading to General or Extra You MUST bring your original valid amateur radio license and a copy of your valid amateur radio license to turn in with your Form 605.</u>
 - o Bring your own pencils and pens.
 - o Calculators are okay to use (if you need one) as long as the memories are cleared.
 - o NO cell Phones allowed

Candidates younger than 18-years old will pay a reduced exam session fee of \$5 to the ARRL VEC VE team when taking an exam. Proper identification must be presented to and verified by the team, per the procedures for all exam candidates (what to bring to an exam session). The \$5 fee is for all candidates under the age of 18 regardless of the exam level taken.

Additional Information - What to Bring to the Testing Session

• If you've already passed a test: The <u>original</u> (and one copy) of any document that you will use to prove you've already passed a test element.

These documents may include:

- o An unexpired Certificate of Successful Completion of Exam (CSCE) indicating the credit(s) earned.
- o Original and copy of a pre-March 21, 1987 Technician license (this provides credit for the Element 3 [General] exam) you must be currently licensed to get this credit.

Expired License? **Original** and a copy of your expired Amateur Radio License - you must take and pass Element number 2 to reinstate your license.

ARE YOU GOING FOR YOUR TECHNICIAN LICENSE? READ THIS IMPORTANT INFORMATION

First-Time Exam Applicants MUST Obtain FCC Registration Number BEFORE Taking Exam

As of **May 20, 2021**, all amateur examination applicants are **required** to provide an FCC Registration Number (FRN) to the Volunteer Examiners (VEs) **BEFORE** taking an amateur exam. This is necessary due to changes the FCC has made to its licensing system. Applicants will create an FCC username and account, respond to the verification email from FCC, and then register for the FRN. Register on the FCC's Commission Registration System (**CORES**): https://apps.fcc.gov/cores/

Email Addresses REQUIRED

As of **June 29**, **2021** all applications will be required to contain an email address for FCC correspondence. Applicants will receive an email direct from the FCC with a link to the official electronic copy of their license whenever a license is issued or changed. ARRL VEC suggests that those without access to email to use the email address of a family member or friend. Licensees will be able to log in to the ULS using their FRN and password to download the latest version of their license at any time. The FCC no longer provides paper license documents.



New FCC \$35 Amateur Application Fee

March 23, 2022 - The FCC released a <u>Public Notice</u> stating that the amateur radio application fees, including those associated with Form 605 application filings, would become **effective on April 19, 2022**. The Federal Communications Commission's authority to impose and collect fees is mandated by Congress. **April 4, 2022** - The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) staff has clarified in response to an ARRL request that the new \$35 application fee will **not apply** to most license modifications, including those to **upgrade an amateur radio licensee's operator class and changes to club station trustees**. The FCC staff explained that the <u>new fees will apply only to applications for a **new** license, **renewal**, rule waiver, or a **new vanity call sign**. As previously announced, the new fees took effect on April 19, 2022.</u>

VECs and Volunteer Examiner (VE) teams will not have to collect the \$35 fee at exam sessions. New applicants will pay the \$15 exam session fee to the ARRL VE team as usual and pay the \$35 application fee directly to the FCC by using the CORES FRN Registration system.

When the FCC receives the examination information from the VEC, it will email a link with payment instructions to each successful candidate. The candidate will have **10 calendar days**, from the date of the application file number being issued, to pay. After the fee is paid, and the FCC has processed an application, examinees will receive a second email from the FCC with a link to their official license. The link will be good for 30 days.

Additionally, the FCC stated that applications processed and dismissed will not be entitled to a refund. This includes vanity requests where the applicant does not receive the requested call sign. However, returned applications that are missing information will not require an additional fee, if the missing information is given to the FCC within the proper amount of time.

Youth Licensing Grant Program

The ARRL Youth Licensing Grant Program, in effect since April 19, 2022, will cover the one-time \$35 application fee for new amateur radio license candidates younger than 18 years old for tests administered under the ARRL Volunteer Examiner Coordinator (VEC) program. "We are thrilled that we are able to provide this opportunity to our youth candidates," said ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM.

The \$35 Federal Communications Commission (FCC) application fee will be reimbursed after the ARRL VEC receives the

completed reimbursement form and after the new license has been issued. The reimbursement check will be mailed to the fee payer. Also, candidates younger than 18 years old would pay a reduced exam session fee of \$5 to the ARRL VEC team at the time of the exam. The \$5 fee is for all candidates under the age of 18, regardless of the exam level taken. Proof of under 18 status is required at the session.

The ARRL Board approved the Youth Licensing Grant Program at its July 2021 meeting in Hartford, Connecticut, expanding on the scope of the original motion proposed by ARRL Southeastern Division Director Mickey Baker, N4MB.

The Board believes the recruitment and training of young amateur radio operators is a necessary and proper mission of the ARRL and subsidization of the \$35 fee will reduce the number of new amateurs that would otherwise be lost from these groups. Initially the new program would serve up to 1,000 new license applicants under 18 years old. The program length is indefinite; it may be renewed or terminated by the Administration and Finance Committee or by the Board of Directors.

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) retired the <u>Legacy version</u> of its **CO**mmission **RE**gistration **S**ystem (**CORES**) on July 15, 2022. CORES is the FCC's public-facing database that enables and tracks certain types of FCC and FCC applicant actions, including amateur radio applications and licenses. Its implementation has enabled routine amateur applications and licenses to be issued overnight instead of over weeks, as was the case with earlier methods. INFORMATION ABOUT THE FCC APPLICATION FEE AND VEC FILED APPLICATIONS

It's been three months since the FCC application fee was implemented on April 19, 2022. Here's what we know so far...

1. MAKE SURE EXAMINEES UNDERSTAND THEY MUST PAY WITHIN 10 DAYS.

Examinees do NOT have to wait for the email from the FCC to pay the fee. As soon as an the application file number is issued by the FCC, they can pay by logging into the CORES Payer FRN System (easier to use but only temporarily available) or the CORES FRN Registration system (CORES - Login).

Application File Number search using an FRN: FCC Application File Number Search

CORES payment system background information and instructions: Information.

CORES step-by-step payment instructions: FCC Application Fee Instructions

- 2. The FCC help center stated there is a known issue with individuals paying the \$35 application fee via a smart phone or tablet. This is not a new issue and they haven't been able to help troubleshoot the issue at the support center. Encourage candidates to login and pay the FCC application fee from a computer.
- **3.** Examinees should NOT amend any applications that a VEC submits on their behalf, especially NEW license applications. Amending VEC filed applications will cause the application to be dismissed without action in the FCC system and potentially require the applicant to pay another \$35 fee. If there is a minor mistake on the application, either call us and we can correct and resubmit the application, or the individual can pay the fee, be issued the call sign, and then log back in and make corrections.
- **4. Individuals should review their application BEFORE paying the fee.** If there is a major error on the application, such as the licensee's name or license class earned is incorrect, or the answer to the felony question is wrong, DO NOT PAY the fee. Call the VEC immediately.
- 5. When in doubt, call the VEC! Even if you think you shouldn't bother us with your question, call us anyway.















MFJ's 50th Anniversary in October



MFJ to Celebrate 50th Anniversary

MFJ Enterprises, an amateur radio electronics manufacturer and retailer, will celebrate 50 years in business this October. Martin Jue, K5FLU, founded the company in 1972 after building a CW filter kit that sold for less than \$10. Since 1990 the company has made five acquisitions, including Hy-Gain and Cushcraft antennas. MFJ Customer Services and Public Relations Manager Richard Stubbs says the company continues to grow with the popularity of amateur radio and currently manufactures over 2,000 products. "I've been with the company for 28 years and the numbers are good," said Stubbs. "Amateur radio continues to grow worldwide."

Quite a few of MFJ's employees have worked there for years, such as MFJ Product Representative Phyllis Randle, who will be retiring in September after 45 years with the company. She started working there when she was a teenager in 1977, and she is now the Product Representative for all MFJ dealers.



Jue graduated from Mississippi State University with a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering, and he earned a master's degree in electrical engineering at Georgia Institute of Technology (Georgia Tech). He served as a professor of electrical engineering at Mississippi State University from 1972 until 1979, but abandoned his doctorate in 1977 because of MFJ's growth.

Currently, because of COVID-19 concerns, the company does not have any plans for a special event to celebrate the anniversary, although Stubbs said that may change in the months ahead.

According to my friends, I'm a POTA addict. I'll wear that badge with honor, though in reality, I am more of an OSPOTA addict. I've been busting it lately

to finish the "Activated All Ohio State Parks" award sponsored by PCARS, and Tom, WB8LCD. The POTA parks are fun to activate also.



This year, my Wife and I decided to visit family in the Colorado Springs area, so how could I not take my POTA gear along? I wasn't sure how things worked when flying with Ham Radio equipment, but the folks on the POTA Facebook group, and Slack channel were a big help. I had never flown with Radio gear in the post 9-11 world, but after this trip, I definitely wouldn't be afraid to do it again.



My gear consisted of my battery, rig, antennas, and misc. cables. The battery, per TSA regulations, can be no more than 160AH for domestic flights. So, my 12AH would do fine. To be honest, neither TSA, nor the airline seemed to bat an eye about the unmarked battery in my carry-on.



The other major part of my gear was the FT-891. That went along with the antennas, and cables into my checked in bag. The antennas consisted of the trusty End Fed Half Wave, and the Wolf River Coil that I have been messing with. Everything was packed into my checked-in bag, and arrived unharmed.

While in Colorado, I managed to do a couple activations. The first activation was at Cheyenne Mountain SP (K-1214) which is south of Colorado Springs, and near the home of




NORAD (not to mention Stargate Command, if you are a fan of the Stargate franchise). I had a little trouble finding a good spot to activate from. The first spot I found worked well, but I had to vacate after about 10 minutes as a wedding was being held there in a few hours. A spot further down the mountain worked well as a plan B. On arrival, I ran into a fellow POTA addict; Ben,

AB2SG who had come out to Cheyenne mountain after seeing the Facebook post about my upcoming activation. At this location, I manged a small number of contacts using the Wolf River Coil. Ben was good enough to offer me some tips for another activation location north of Colorado Springs.

A couple days later, using the info he sent, I headed out to Pike National Forest (K-4404) for an early morning activation. This one went much better as I was able to deploy the EFHW from the top of a 30'





Ponderosa Pine at a trailhead near Monument, CO. Conditions were great on 20, which enabled me to run not only CW, but managed SSB, and FT-8.

40 Meters at both activations wasn't great. I can't be sure if this was due to propagation, or just lack of activity. Some have said that POTA is mostly an east of the Mississippi thing, but I don't really buy into that. But, 20 did turn out to be the workhorse band for both activations. The best DX was Japan on 20 FT8.



One thing this trip reminded me of was how good we have it here in Ohio. We are one of the US states without an entrance fee to our state parks. State Park parking passes in CO are \$9 a car per day.



There was one other POTA location in the area, but I just didn't feel I had the time or the 4 wheel drive to attempt it. Rosemont Wildlife area (K-9666) is part of the water supply for the city of Colorado Springs, and is best accomplished via 4WD.

So, back home now, I'm getting ready to try out the goody that the UPS driver just delivered. More on that next month. In the meantime, just get outside, and get on the air! Don't forget OSPOTA!

While not all the mileposts need stations at them, what is needed are operators for 2 Aid Shuttles, SAG vehicle, Aid stations, Watering stations, Med tent and pivotal locations at intersections along the route.

This is a premier event that helps us amateur radio operators showcase our skills and equipment. Several of the public service agencies are more than impressed with the way we are able to assist in ways that they cannot and this is why amateur radio has been a part of the Akron Marathon in this, its' 20th year.












Hello OSPOTA fans. Seems like Summer is passing faster than usual and that means the 15th annual OSPOTA contest is coming up sooner than you think. Make your plans, test that antenna set up, get out there and have some fun during OSPOTA 2022 on September 10th from 10:00 am to 6:00 pm eastern time.

A note to remember - you are visiting an Ohio State Park. You are just a visitor, so please keep the area neat and clean and check the surrounding area to pick up any trash accidently dropped before you depart.

Also, as in the past, some park officials seem to think that since you are participating in OSPOTA, you need some sort of permit - You do not need a permit. You are just a visitor to the park that happens to be a ham operator testing out emergency communications with other hams in other state parks - again, you are a visitor to the park. However be aware that the local Rangers may still require registration as an "event". See the latest information on the OSPOTA web site (www.ospota.org) or on the OSPOTA IO Group site - THERE HAVE BEEN UPDATES to the rules and other documents.

You have no special rights as to where you can set up and please don't make any demands to a Park Ranger. That's the easiest way to get tossed out of a State Park. Be polite, invite the Park Ranger(s) to see what you are doing and make sure you let him/her know that this is really like practicing emergency communications for public service. More and more governmental agencies such as Police, Public Health Departments, EMA, FEMA, Dept of Health & Human Services, Red Cross, etc. recognize how important amateur radio is for emergency communications.

"When All Else Fails, Amateur Radio Works".

Most of the time when you talk to the Park Rangers about this aspect - they think it's pretty cool and they leave you alone.

So - be polite - and most of all **HAVE FUN!** Take some pictures while you're out there, too.

The OSPOTA IO Group page is used for messaging and sharing of information about OSPOTA for all the fans and participants in the OSPOTA contest. The E-mail Group is where the action is. Since we do allow spotting to encourage more contacts during OSPOTA, Facebook is being used before and during the contest for instant updates and to share stories and photos.

As the contest draws near, we'll be posting on the OSPOTA E-mail Group page the anticipated 'who's going to be at what Ohio State Park' or 'Planned Park' list as we have in past years. Send your planned park activation information to PlannedParks@ospota.org. Please, include the call sign that will be used and the Ohio State Park you plan to be at. If your plans change, just let us know and we'll update the list. Remember, more than one person or group can be at an Ohio State Park – there are no reserved State Parks.

Tips for Succeeding at OSPOTA

Last year, I started making notes of things I'd like to tell everyone before OSPOTA 2022. I called it "Tips for Succeeding at OSPOTA". Following is what I have so far:

Plan Ahead - If you are planning to camp for the weekend of OSPOTA, make your reservations early. Since COVID reared its ugly head in 2020, campgrounds fill up fast. Finding campsites gets a tad easier after Labor Day, but it's still good to know that you have your reservations in. Granted we are only a week away, but don't wait till the last minute.

Test your logging software ahead of time – the day before (or of) OSPOTA is NOT the time to be learning how to use your logging software. If you have questions, post it to the OSPOTA groups, or reach out to me directly, and I'll help if I can.

Use 80 Meters - Ohio State Parks On The air is a great contest as well as a cool excuse to get out and enjoy an Ohio State Park for a day (or an entire weekend). If you're participating from within an Ohio State Park, then you can expect most of your Park to Park contacts points to come from 80 Meters. Though Park to Park contacts within Ohio have been done on other bands, 80 will be your bread & Butter band for these types of contacts. Don't leave your 80 Meter antenna at home!

Know when not to use 80 Meters – While your multipliers will mostly come from 80 Meters, it's good to scan the other bands too, especially if you are operating from inside an Ohio State Park. Why is that? Because In-Park stations are allowed to work everyone! So get out on other bands too. 20 & 40 Meters, for instance can net you a lot of contacts, and these all count towards your final score.

Don't be afraid to start calling CQ - Once someone spots you, be prepared for some pileups. Make sure you know your POTA park number as well as your OSPOTA designator. At some point during the day, someone will ask you for both. You can find all this info at ospota.org/Files/OSPOTA-WWF-POTA-Identifiers-2020.pdf.

Of course, once you hand out all these contacts to the POTA hunters, the only way they'll get credit for the contact is if YOU submit your logs to POTA. We do not submit your logs to any other organizations. You can learn all about signing up to submit your logs to POTA at https://docs.pota.app/

If you are operating from a NOT-IN-Park station, then you are limited to working only Ohio State Park stations for credit. That's even more motivation to get out to an Ohio state Park for the contest, right?

PLEASE Spot US! – Per the OSPOTA rules, In-Park stations are not allowed to spot themselves. But, we can ask you to spot us. If you spot those In-Park stations you hear, they will appreciate it.

Where to spot? – You can spot stations at DX Summit (http://dxsummit.fi/#/). DX Watch is a good spotting network (https://dxwatch.com/) also POTA has an excellent spotting page (https://pota.app/#/) that is free to use, but you must be logged in to add a spot.

WWFF also has a spotting page (https://www.cqgma.org/wwff/smartwwff/wwffspots.php?i=0), but I'm not real familiar with it. For my money, I use the POTA page 100% of the time.

Log Rovers properly! - Starting last year, we allowed Rovers for OSPOTA. Since it was the first year for it, we went easy on everyone during scoring, and didn't penalize improperly logged contacts. This year however, will be different.

ROVERS MUST give their callsigns as Call/R (i.e. K8BF/R).

HUNTERS must log exactly what the rovers send.

Failure to log that /R will be a busted call.

And another thing – We saw a few instances last year where Canadian provinces were logged by their ARRL designators. **Canadian provinces are considered DX**, and must be logged as such. If we see a station logged as being in a Canadian province, we count it as a busted call.

(Note from WG8X- I do log the provinces, because I like having that info in my master log. But, I correct it on the copy of the log that I send in to OSPOTA)

Keep a notepad handy - If given, I write down POTA numbers for all Non Ohio State Park contacts. The modified N3FJP logging program that I use for OSPOTA doesn't give extra fields where a POTA number can be inserted.

After the contest, I manually enter all my Park to Park contacts into my log before merging it with my master log. It's a bit old-school, but it works for me.

DO NOT USE WORD - After the contest, you'll create your Cabrillo file, and will need to do some editing before submitting it to logs@ospota.org. Open it in a text editor, such as notepad, WordPad what have you, but **PLEASE DO NOT USE WORD**. Word can insert some weird formatting such as tabs that can wreak havoc with the log checking process, and create headaches for me.

Lastly – If you have questions about OSPOTA, please reach out to us in advance so we can help. We have a mailing list at groups.io (https://groups.io/g/OSPOTA), and we are also on Facebook.

Or, you can email us (<u>info@ospota.org</u>). If you have a logging question, you can contact me directly at john@wg8x.net.

And that is it. We want you to have a fun time with OSPOTA. This is our 15th year, so let's make it a great one.















LOGGING

What to use? - Well, in short, use whatever logging software makes you happy. But, remember to log all the pertinent information for each contact (ie callsign, time, date, mode, and QTH). Don't forget to use the proper park abbreviations for Ohio State Parks. OSPOTA has been around since 2008, and we have our own three character abbreviations for Ohio State Parks. You can find these on our website at ospota.org.

There's so many options to use for logging, but I kind of lean towards a modified version of the N3FJP OH QSO Party logger.

As long as you can create a proper Cabrillo file for submitting your entry, your choice is up to you.

So, let's begin with N3FJP

I say this every year, but as always, please don't try this unless you are comfortable "lifting the hood" on your computer.

First, make sure that you have the most recent version of the N3FJP Ohio QSO Party program installed.

Use the Ohio In-State QSO Party Log Version 4.6.3 which is the latest Scott charges a very minimal \$8.99 for this software.

If you do not have the software installed, do so now. Enter your registration code that Scott will send you, and ensure that everything works. All set? Cool! Now let's lift the hood!

Let's start with a few Caveats:

- You are modifying the N3FJP OHQP software to do something that it was not designed to do. If you keep this in mind, then this can be a valid option for OSPOTA. I've used it for the last several years, and it works like a charm for OSPOTA. It also logs the band & frequency from your rig. All that is required is a replacement of one file.
- Don't rely on this for scoring. This modification is for duping purposes only. You will do the scoring after the contest ends.
- PLEASE Make sure that your computer clock is correct, and that you are logging in UTC

Complete instructions can be found at https://ospota.org/Files/N3FJP_logging_hack-2022.pdf

After contest Cabrillo generation is a snap.

- Look on the File menu for "Write Cabrillo (Contest Submittal) File". Once you create your Cabrillo file, and save it to your computer, open it in a text editor, and correct as needed. For instance: CONTEST: MRCC-OHQP should be changed to CONTEST: OSPOTA
- CLAIMED SCORE This line can be deleted since we use the score from the summary sheet that you fill out and submit.
- Save Cabrillo using the convention "YourCallSignUsed.log", and you are good to go.


3905 Century Club Eyeball Visits PCARS






National POW MIA Recognition Day

National POW/MIA Recognition Day is observed annually in September around a central theme to show commitment to full accountability to the families of captured service members and missing war heroes.

The term POW and MIA mean prisoner of war and military personnel who went missing in action.

Many service members suffered as prisoners during the several wars that have happened throughout the history of the U.S. National POW/MIA Recognition Day was initiated as the day to commemorate with the family of many of the tens of thousands of service members who never made it home.



The day was first observed in 1979 after Congress and the president passed a resolution to make it official following the demands of the families of 2,500 Vietnam War POW/MIAs who asked for accountability in finding their loved ones.it is also mostly associated with service members who were prisoners of war during the Vietnam War.

Regardless of where they are held in the country, National POW/MIA Recognition Day ceremonies share the common purpose of honoring those who were held captive and returned, as well as the memory of those who remain missing in service to the United States. Until 1979, there was no formal day set aside for these important men and women and the first observance of POW/MIA day included a remembrance ceremony at the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. Since then, the Pentagon is where the official observance happens, with other celebrations happening at military bases around the country and elsewhere.

The remains of almost 82,000 Americans are still missing, according to the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency DPPA. The DPAA reports that the numbers of missing soldiers from conflicts as:

73,515 from World War II (an approximate number due to limited or conflicting data)

7,841 from the Korean War 1,626 from Vietnam 126 from the Cold War 6 from conflicts since 1991

This will be the 14th year the special event station K4MIA has been activated. The first year about 600 contacts were made a large percentage from veterans or families of veterans. The event has grown with operators all over the



country. Last year over 5500 contacts were made. This year the Fair View ARC (NJ) will be joining us. **Primary operational days will be Sept 10 through Sept 18**. We will be operating SSB, CW, FT8. On Sept 16, K4MIA will be operating from a Vietnam UH1H Huey helicopter. There will be sister stations K4MIA/2 K4MIA/3 K4MIA/4 K4MIA/5 K4MIA/7 and K4MIA/8. Throughout the month, K4MIA will operate Satellites, EME, and other less used digital modes (PSK32, Hell Scriber, RTTY, SSTV). Besides operating from our home QTHs we will operate from a VA Hospital, an American Legion Post and various parks as part of POTA. We are trying to increase the awareness of our POWs and MIAs. Because of the volume of requests, you MUST SEND SASE to K4MIA for a

returned QSL. Please take time to remember our POW's and MIA's as well as their families. I would like to include KIA's and all veterans (past and present) that have given so much for this country.

On September 10 thru the 18th of 2022 We will honor and support our Veterans with a Special Event on the air as K4MIA/8. Linda, N8LRS and Metro, W8MET will be the sister-station from Ohio for our 7th year. Thanks for being part of this event. Details can be found on the ARRL website under "ON-THE-AIR" under SPECIAL EVENT under the call-letters of K4MIA. Also, this Special Event will be in the September QST. Please take part in this Special Event for our Veterans. QSL is available with SASE. We will be operating on 40 meter's SSB.

PCARS Ham Radio License Plates Wanted !!! PLEASE !!

Dig out that amateur radio call sign license plate (with your present call sign), clean it up and bring it to be permanently affixed to the wall in the PCARS club station.

We have 75 PCARS member's ham plates now, **but we can use more**. Don't have ham radio call plates on your vehicle? Well for those of you in Ohio, you can get the plates sent to you by going to any License Bureau office and filling out the special plate registration form. Have a copy of your current FCC license when you apply. The official form to obtain your Ohio Amateur Radio license plates is on the PCARS IO Group site. Then you'll have an old plate to bring in to get hung up as a *permanent* part of PCARS history.



Communications Commission may apply for these plates. The official call letters will be the license plate numbers.

Registrant Eligibility: Owner must submit a copy of the un-revoked and unexpired official amateur radio license issued by the Federal Communications Commission. (FCC).

<u>Title Requirements:</u> Ohio Certificate of Title issued in the same name as the FCC license, either singly or jointly, or the name on the FCC license is the same name on the lease agreement.

<u>Vehicle Information:</u> These plates may be issued to passenger vehicles, non-commercial trucks, recreational vehicles, house vehicles and non-commercial trailers.

Type of Plates: Plates will be manufactured with the FCC license.

Issuance Information: Amateur Radio plates cannot be issued with system assigned, reserved, or personalized plate formats.

Renewal of plates can be done at your local Deputy Registrar or by mail using their renewal notice. **Amateur Radio License Holders must** provide a copy of their current unexpired and unrevoked official amateur radio license issued by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) at the time of <u>any type renewal transaction</u>.

All plates will be mailed directly to the address on your registration card unless customer requests otherwise. The deputy will issue your registration card, stickers and provide you with a permit which will allow you to operate your vehicle while your plates are being manufactured. Special license plate applications are available at all Deputy Registrar license agency locations. These plates cost an additional \$10.00 annually plus the normal registration fees. The fee is determined by Ohio Revised Code section 4503.14.




PCARS Meetings


